Elise Herzig is the Executive Director of JIAS (Jewish Immigrant Aid Services) Toronto, a settlement agency that has been serving newcomers and refugees for over 100 years. In this role, Elise has exponentially grown the agency's clients, programs, revenues, and partnerships. Prior to joining JIAS in 2019, Elise worked as a senior executive and consultant in the private and public sectors creating transformational changes and helping organizations remain relevant and sustainable. Elise is a huge advocate of creating trusted collaborations that resonate with the values of each stakeholder so that new possibilities emerge.

Elise has a long-standing relationship with McMaster University. In 2016, she helped create and design the McMaster Indigenous Research Institute to address the urgent need of creating a harmonized approach that utilizes both Indigenous Knowledge and ways of knowing (IK) and mainstream research practices and protocols. As Director of Commercial Operations for the McMaster Nuclear Reactor (MNR), Elise spearheaded the turnaround of the reactor, which had been scheduled for shutdown. She made MNR a financially viable operation that became the largest global supplier of Iodine-125 and increased MNR's revenues 25-fold. Elise has worked in multiple fields, including five years in the energy sector as CEO of the Ontario Energy Association.

Elise is the recipient of the King Charles III Coronation Medal and the National Metropolis Service Provider Award (Non-Profit). She has a Bachelor of Commerce degree from McGill University and a Master of Business Administration from the Schulich School of Business.

Ahmed Hussein has served as the Chief Executive Officer of TNO – The Neighbourhood Organization, a Toronto-based multi-service agency, since 2014. Under his visionary leadership, TNO has grown from a modest team of 35 staff to an organization of over 300 employees, delivering a wide range of services across Ontario.

With over 30 years of leadership in the community and settlement sector, Ahmed has been a driving force in responding to the evolving needs of newcomers and communities across Canada. He has played a critical role in the transformation of the settlement and community-based service landscape, aligning programs and strategies with changing immigration policies and integration frameworks.

Ahmed's impact goes beyond Canada's borders. He has led the development of innovative programs in regions across Africa and the Middle East, helping to build capacity in global community service delivery.

He is a respected voice in national and provincial settlement discourse, regularly contributing to forums such as the Ontario Council of Agencies Serving Immigrants (OCASI), Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship Canada (IRCC), and the Canadian Council for Refugees.

Ahmed holds academic credentials in Public Policy from the Caledon Public Policy Institute and a Master's degree in Infrastructure Planning (MIP) from the University of Stuttgart in Germany.

One of Ahmed's signature accomplishments is his leadership in integrating social and health services to improve access for newcomers through a "one-stop" model. This innovative approach allows individuals to access settlement services, primary healthcare, and other supports all in one place.

He was also instrumental in the creation of the Thorncliffe Park Hub, a \$25 million centre that has become a cornerstone of newcomer support in the community. Ahmed successfully brought together all levels of government and private donors to support the Hub's construction, making it a model for collaborative service delivery in urban communities. nistration from the Schulich School of Business.

The Honourable Marc Miller was first elected in 2015 as the Member of Parliament for Ville-Marie–Le Sud-Ouest–Île-des-Soeurs in Montréal. He previously served as Minister of Crown-Indigenous Relations; Minister of Indigenous Services; and Minister of Immigration, Refugees and Citizenship.

Before entering politics, Minister Miller was a practising lawyer. He specialized in mergers and acquisitions, with a focus on international and commercial law, and worked in Montréal, Stockholm and New York City. Previously, he served as an infantry soldier in the Canadian Armed Forces.

Minister Miller made history in 2017 when he delivered a statement in the House of Commons entirely in Mohawk, marking the first time the language had been spoken in either the House of Commons or Senate since Confederation. He has also been a forceful advocate for increased federal investment in affordable housing, public transit and the Canada Child Benefit.

Minister Miller has been involved in several charitable and pro bono legal initiatives. He has also authored articles on constitutional and human rights law.

Minister Miller is a graduate of the Université de Montréal, where he earned Bachelor's and Master's degrees in Political Science. He also graduated from McGill University with degrees in Common Law and Civil Law.

Samina most recently led COSTI as CEO, a social service organization providing a variety of programs including skills training, employment, social services, gender-based violence education, emergency shelters, and housing. Samina previously served as the Executive Director of Community Safety at York University where she oversaw 24/7 community safety and emergency operations and she led the community-driven strategy, "Safer Together."

Prior to joining the Region and holding leadership positions at COSTI and York University, she also held a variety of leadership and policy roles with the Government of Ontario. While in government, she oversaw a diverse range of priorities, including gender-based violence strategies, public safety programs, economic development policies, community grant programs and public affairs.

She was also an Instructor at the Ontario Police College where she oversaw curricula development and training for police services across Ontario, including in adult education, hate crimes, community policing and anti-racism.

Samina holds a Bachelor of Science and Master of Education from the University of Toronto and a joint Executive Master of Business Administration from the Schulich School of Business and the Kellogg School of Management.

Roda Muse became the Deputy Minister of Francophone Affairs with the Government of Ontario in May 2023. Roda was the Secretary-General of the Canadian Commission for the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO). The Canadian Commission for UNESCO serves as a bridge between Canadians and the vital work of the UNESCO, including the deployment and coordination of UNESCO programs and networks in Canada.

Before joining the Commission, Roda served as a senior public servant for 20+ years. In her last role, she served as a manager in the Department of Innovation, Sciences and Economic Development Canada, overseeing the development of strategic policy advice and recommendations on innovation, official languages, economic development, and mental health. Roda also served as the Ontario regional director for Status of women Canada.

Among her many achievements was the partnership she struck in the early 2000s with the City of Ottawa, the federal public service, and the Centre d'Intégration, de Formation et de Développement Économique to support the integration of visible minority professionals into the federal public service.

In 2003, Roda co-founded Fondation Acacia, a charitable organization dedicated to fostering excellence in young visible minority Francophones through education and mentoring. She was also the first BIPOC elected as a school board trustee in the Francophone system in Ottawa, among other board of director roles for various organizations. Roda served as a Board Member at the Montfort Hospital and ACEPO Consortium of Centre Jules-Léger.

Roda holds a Master of Public Administration with a concentration in International Management from École nationale d'administration publique (ENAP). She has completed a Master of Education with a concentration in Enseignement du français langue étrangère from Université Paul Valéry - Montpellier in France. She also holds a Bachelor of Literature with a concentration in Modern Languages from Université de Picardie - Amiens in France.

Sahana Mukherjee is the Associate Director of race and ethnicity research at Pew Research Center. She is an expert on issues of immigration, national identity, and the experiences of U.S. Hispanic, Black and Asian populations. She works across the Center's research process, from designing surveys, analyzing surveys and demographic data, and writing reports that inform public conversation and news coverage.

Before joining the Center, she led a research team at a global consulting firm and served as a tenured professor and department chair at Gettysburg College. She has published widely in academic and non-academic outlets, received multiple grants and awards, and served in leadership and advisory roles in professional organizations. She earned her Ph.D. in Social Psychology from the University of Kansas and a B.A. in Psychology, Sociology, and English from Christ University, India.

Barbara Perry is a Professor in the Faculty of Social Science and Humanities at Ontario Tech University, and the Director of the Centre on Hate, Bias and Extremism, and holds a UNESCO Chair in Hate Studies. She has written extensively on social justice generally, and hate crime and right-wing extremism specifically. She has published several books spanning each of these areas, including *Diversity, Crime and Justice in Canada*, *In the Name of Hate: Understanding Hate Crime*, and *Right-wing Extremism in Canada*. She was the General Editor of a five volume set on hate crime (Praeger), and editor of Volume 3: *Victims of Hate Crime* of that set. In 2019, she published *Right-wing Extremism in Canada*, and in 2022 she published *Right-wing Extremism in Canada and the United States*. Her work has been published in journals representing diverse disciplines: *Theoretical Criminology*, *Studies in Conflict and Terrorism*, *Journal of History and Politics*, and *American Indian Quarterly*. Dr. Perry continues to work in the area of hate crime, and has made substantial contributions to the limited scholarship on hate crime in Canada, including work on anti-Muslim violence, antisemitic hate crime, hate crime against 2SLGBTQI communities, the community impacts of hate crime, and right-wing extremism in Canada. She is regularly called upon by policy makers, practitioners, and local, national and international media as an expert on hate crime and right-wing extremism.

She holds the prestigious UNESCO Chair in Hate Studies, focusing on education, awareness, and evidence-based policy to prevent hate. She was appointed a Member of the Order of Canada in recognition of her vital work in raising public awareness and supporting victims of violence. She is a sought-after consultant for government and law enforcement agencies—including Justice Canada, Public Safety Canada, and the RCMP—and a frequent media commentator.

Mohammed Hashim is CEO and Executive Director of the Canadian Race Relations Foundation, with over 20 years of experience as a human rights advocate in Canada. His work has spanned civil society, government, and the labour movement, with a focus on advancing innovative public policy to address racism and strengthen inclusion.

Under Mohammed's leadership, the CRRF has helped shape national anti-racism strategies, convened critical public conversations, and supported communities across Canada in developing local responses to systemic discrimination. A strategic leader and coalition-builder, Mohammed works at the intersection of policy, community, and institutions, advancing practical solutions to combat hate, strengthen public trust, and ensure democratic systems better reflect and serve diverse communities.

Scott McLeish is the Director for the Centre for Population and Social Statistics at Statistics Canada. His centre is responsible for measuring the characteristics, experiences and outcomes of diverse populations living in Canada. This includes areas related to immigration, ethnocultural characteristics, religion, disability, military experiences, gender, and sexual orientation.

In addition, his centre is responsible for the General Social Statistics Program which measures changes in social conditions, outcomes, and identity in Canada. His centre leads, or contributes to, multiple statistical programs including the Census of Population, the General Social Survey, the Canadian Survey on Disability, the Longitudinal Immigration Database, and the Canadian Veteran Health Survey, among others.

Prior to his current role, Scott has held various positions across Statistics Canada for over 20 years in domains ranging from population health to immigration statistics.

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The Honourable Stéphane Dion

Stéphane Dion is a former Canadian diplomat and politician who served as Canada's ambassador to Germany from 2017 and 2022 and to France and Monaco from 2022 to 2025, as well as Special Envoy to Europe from 2017 to 2025.

From 2006 to 2008, he was Leader of the Opposition and led the Liberal Party of Canada. He also served as Minister of Foreign Affairs (2015-2017), Minister of the Environment (2004-2006), and Minister of Intergovernmental Affairs (1996-2003). He represented the district of Saint-Laurent-Cartierville (later renamed Saint-Laurent) in the House of Commons from 1996 to 2017.

Back at the Université de Montréal, where he was previously a professor of political science, Stéphane Dion is now the university's Diplomat in Residence, where he aims to share his experience with students.

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The Honourable Bob Rae

The Honourable Bob Rae brings over five decades of leadership at the highest levels of international diplomacy, national politics, and public policy.

Rae served as the Ambassador and Permanent Representative of Canada to the United Nations in New York from 2020 to 2025, joining the likes of Lester Pearson and George Davidson as Canadians elected in their personal capacity to preside over UN Charter bodies. During his tenure, Rae became the President of the Economic and Social Council (ECOSOC) for 2024-25, the second Canadian to assume the role, and also chaired the Advisory Committee on Haiti and led discussions on financing for development, children in armed conflict, and counterterrorism.

Prior to his diplomatic service, Rae served as Premier of Ontario from 1990-1995 and interim Leader of the Liberal Party of Canada from 2011 to 2013. He was elected to federal and provincial parliaments 11 times between 1978 and 2013 and has been honoured by the alumni of both bodies for his distinguished service. His return to Parliament representing Toronto Centre in 2008 led to his appointment as Foreign Affairs spokesman and ultimately to his role as interim Leader.

Rae also served as Canada's Special Envoy to Myanmar in 2017, where he engaged in diplomatic efforts to address the crisis in Rakhine State and authored the influential report "Tell Them We're Human". In March 2020, he was named Canada's Special Envoy on Humanitarian and Refugee Issues by Prime Minister Trudeau, leading to his report "A Global Pandemic Requires a Global Response." He also served as Chief Negotiator for the nine First Nations of the Matawa Tribal Council in Northern Ontario from 2013 to 2018 and was appointed to the Security and Intelligence Review Committee by Prime Minister Chrétien.

Rae has practiced law with three distinguished firms and led high-profile assignments including the restructuring of the Canadian Red Cross and the Toronto Symphony Orchestra.

Between 1996-99 and 2013-2020, Rae taught law, politics, and public policy at the University of Toronto, serving as the Wilson Professor of Public Policy at Victoria University from 2016 to 2020. He is a Fellow of the Forum of Federations (an organization he co-founded in the 1990s), Massey College, and the Raoul Wallenberg Centre for Human Rights.

Rae is a Rhodes Scholar with an M.Phil in Politics from Balliol College, Oxford University, and a law degree from the University of Toronto. He is a Privy Councillor, a Companion of the Order of Canada, and a member of the Order of Ontario.

A graduate of the John F. Kennedy School of Government, Harvard University, and fellow at the Harvard Law School, Robert Watts has been involved in Indigenous issues for more than 30 years. He was an adjunct professor and Distinguished Fellow at Queens University in the School of Policy Studies.

He was also the Vice President of Indigenous Relations at the Nuclear Waste Management Organization. Currently he is a principal at First People Group with a focus on Reconciliation. In addition, he advises corporations, civil society organizations and governments on reconciliation and Indigenous strategy. Previously, he was Chief of Staff and Chief Executive Officer for the Assembly of First Nations (AFN) and Interim Executive Director of Canada's Truth and Reconciliation Commission. A former public servant, he was an Assistant Deputy Minister with the federal government and senior executive with the province of Ontario. He has taught, debated and lectured at a number of universities in Canada and the United States and at the Canada School of Public Service. Robert is of Mohawk and Ojibway ancestry and resides at the Six Nations Reserve.

Bob is really driven by the opportunity to help build a bright future for our future generations as imagined in the Seven Generations teachings. Unity in diversity and reconciliation are twin themes which help guide his work.
