The Canadian Race Relations Foundation presents: The 2020 Canada Lecture with Jean Teillet



Jean Teillet, IPC (BFA, LL.B, LL.M) is the great-grandniece of Louis Riel and an Indigenous rights lawyer. She is the author of *Métis Law in Canada* and *The North-West is Our Mother: The Story of Louis Riel's People, the Métis Nation.* Jean has long been engaged in negotiations and litigation with provincial and federal governments concerning Métis and First Nation land rights, harvesting rights, commercial harvesting and self-government. Jean is a frequent author and lecturer on issues surrounding access to justice, Indigenous rights, identity and mobility.

She has presented internationally in Russia, Poland, Israel, Japan, United States and China. In Canada, she has spoken at conferences for the National Judicial Institute, the Law Society of Upper Canada, the Ontario Native Justices of the Peace, the Universities of Alberta, Ottawa, Saskatoon and Toronto, among others.

In 2007, the University of Windsor Faculty of Law established the Jean Teillet Access to Justice Scholarship to honour her work as a human rights lawyer. In 2012 she received a Queen Elizabeth II Diamond Jubilee Medal and in 2014, Jean was awarded an honorary doctorate from the University of Guelph for her impact on Indigenous rights law.
